### Cooking from our produce



Whilst we waited for all the families to arrive at the school for the gardening club, Ellie Watson showed her grandma the sensory garden she had helped create (a big thank-you to Aspatria Charity shop for their kind donation).

In previous weeks the group had been sowing seeds, making hanging baskets, creating a sensory garden and this week were about to tackle creating their own homemade rhubarb crumble from some of their own home-grown rhubarb.

Daniel James and Josh Armstrong showed the younger children how to harvest the rhubarb stems ready for using in the crumble to be prepared up in the school's food technology class room.

Everyone was keen to get started and after a quick demonstration we all, young and old, got stuck in.

We used 10 stems of rhubarb, 5 tablespoons of sugar and 10 tablespoons of water then heated it all together till cooked.

We emptied the contents into our silver dishes and topped with crumble mix. We covered with silver foil ready to take home and bake for another 20 minutes at gas mark 4 or 180°C, delicious. **Mrs Skillicorn**

Run by the University of Cumbria's lecturers and student ambassadors, this outreach activity aims to increase students' confidence in their ability to move on to higher education whilst delivering a media studies taster course. This event is organised and funded by Aimhigher Cumbria.

The Roadshow gave our young people a chance to try out some high tech media equipment and by the end of the day they had produced their own news broadcast, including studio interviews, weather forecasts and video recordings from around the school.

Feedback comments from our students always rate this activity very highly and this year was no different. YR 9 all responded really well, met the challenge and gained some very valuable skills in the process. As well as building their confidence the Media Roadshow allowed the students to develop a range of skills from thinking and team working, to interviewing and presentation skills and as they had to produce a real TV programme, it generated quite an exciting atmosphere.

Maths can seem a very abstract subject at times with little relevance to everyday life. One of the most common questions I get asked is 'When will we ever use this outside of school?' Sometimes the answer is 'Perhaps never'. But does everything we do have to have relevance? What about trying to solve a problem because it is complex, challenging, enjoyable and satisfying?

This year 20 of our students have done just that by taking part in the Junior National Maths Challenge (years 7 and 8) and the Intermediate National Maths Challenge (years 9 and 10). This involves sitting a paper of varied challenging mathematical questions and pitting yourself against other students nationally. It is a difficult challenge and I commend all of those willing to take part. Two of our students, Scott Batchelor (Yr8) and Ronnie Morris (Yr10) achieved the bronze award for their efforts which is an excellent result.

Of course the functionality of maths is an important aspect of the subject, as is the appreciation of the maths around us in our surroundings. Year 7's have explored the maths in nature (and in their own bodies) by investigating the Golden Ratio. This ratio (approximately equal to 1.6) occurs naturally in beautiful objects such as the patterns on shells, the arrangements of some plants and the markings on some creatures. It has also been shown that the features and proportions of beautiful people fit this ratio! Year 7 explored how close they came to physical mathematical perfection!

The year 9's quickly realised the importance of budgeting when they undertook a project to buy or rent a flat, furnish it, feed and clothe themselves and manage transport costs on a fixed given monthly income. The actual cost of living appeared as quite an eye-opener to some and a lot of compromising had to be done!

The use of maths in everyday life is something that is becoming more of a feature in the new GCSE Specification which starts in September. Of course it is important that the necessity and practicality of maths is apparent to students but I also hope that there will always be a few who just appreciate maths for the challenges and the wonder it creates in its own abstract way.

Having won an award for “Living for Sport” and, conveniently, with Sports Day and the Swimming Gala looming scarily close, Beacon Hill students needed a little boost of inspiration to liven up our sporting spirit. And who better to deliver than Olympic Gold Medallist, Darren Campbell.

When Darren walked onto stage nobody would have guessed that he had a Gold and Silver medal under his belt, he seemed so normal! Darren talked to us of his life-long dream to walk out onto the Olympic stage, inspired by Carl Lewis who he had seen win four Gold medals at the Olympics.

Amazingly Darren’s sporting talent was discovered at the tender age of eight! After he left school, he worked long hours, training hard, that Olympic dream scorching him forwards. In the 1996 he competed in his first Olympics, one of the youngest in Team Britain. However disaster struck as he dropped his baton in his 4 x 100m relay. Darren didn’t let his dream roll away with his baton! He stuck out the harsh comments from the media and steeled himself to working hard to change the minds of the nation, returning four years later in the 2000 Olympics, more determined than ever, to win a **Silver** medal at 200m.
